THE SACRED TRIDUUM: A Journey of Faith, Hope, and Love

As we approach the most sacred days of the liturgical year, the Church invites us to enter deeply into the mystery of our salvation through the celebration of the Easter Triduum. The Triduum, which begins on Holy Thursday evening and concludes with the Easter Vigil, is the heart of our Catholic faith.
